

# Lake Sunapee Region VNA

Lake Sunapee Region VNA & Hospice is pleased to announce the selection of Scott Fabry, RN, MBA as President and CEO, effective June 1. He succeeds Andrea Steel, who will retire on May 31 after 35 years of service to the agency.

A search committee consisting of trustees and senior staff met intensively over a four-month period. Some three dozen applications were received from as far away as New Mexico, Ohio, and Florida as well as from local candidates. The comprehensive search process included both telephone and personal interviews.

"Scott has the professional background required for the position as well as a thorough grasp of the agency's unique needs. He will be a strong and effective leader who supports the long-standing values of the VNA and understands the challenges of a complex health care system," says Ward O'Neill, VNA Board Chair.

Fabry is currently Clinical Director at Lake Sunapee Region VNA & Hospice, a position he has held since 2006. In this role, he is responsible for all acute care services and supervises more than 25 licensed nurses and therapy professionals.

Fabry received his nursing degree from Castleton State College. He went on to earn a Master of Business Administration in Health Practice Management from Franklin Pierce College. Fabry and his wife Tracey reside in Grantham with their three children: Corey, Isabelle, and Cole.

Fabry is well known to the VNA, having been one of the agency's RN Case Managers from 2001 to 2004. He has brought extensive hospital-based clinical experience, including intensive nursing care, to colleagues and other professional associates with whom the agency collaborates.

Fabry served as Clinical Resource Coordinator and Continuing Care Manager at Dartmouth Hitchcock Medical Center and has held positions at Norwalk Hospital and Hospital of St. Raphael. In addition to his clinical knowledge and experience, Fabry brings a strong business background, having served as Assistant

# Teen CSIs To Get CPR Training This Summer

LRGHealthcare offers a Teen CSI (Caring Student Interns) program at both Lakes Region General Hospital and Franklin Regional Hospital. This exciting program offers teens hands-on experience in a hospital setting, providing them the opportunity to determine if a career in healthcare is something they would enjoy.

New for the 2008 CSI program are cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) training and emergency evacuation training. Participants will be offered the training required to gain a certificate in Basic Life Support and will also learn safe ways to evacuate immobile individuals in an emergency situation.

These two new offerings are in addition to the established curriculum of blood pressure and respiration training,

first aid skills, and visits to the surgical suites, laboratory, medical imaging, pharmacy, and much more.

Upon completion of the six-week program, students are eligible to volunteer on the medical units at either hospital, working directly with the Licensed Nurses' Aides.


