Proctor Girls Take New England Basketball Title

Proctor Academy's girls varsity basketball team traveled to Noble and Gre-enough School for the NEPSAC Class C Championship against number-three seed Lexington Christian Academy. Less than 24 hours after an epic upset over number-one seed Kimball Union Academy, the Hornets were eager to earn their first NEPSAC Championship since 2008.

With all but two members of its roster from New Hampshire, the girls did not disappoint, and walked away with a 61-45 win and the Class C New England title.

After a convincing opening-round win over Hamden Hall (60-22), Proctor advanced to the semi-finals against a KUA team that was 21-4 entering the match-up. KUA had been a thorn in

Proctor's side for the past five seasons, beating the Hornets twice in the regular season.

Proctor got in early foul trouble in the semi-final with Angelique Ngalakulondi '19 (Manchester) and Amber Wilson '16 (New York City) on the bench with three fouls in the first half; they picked up their fourth fouls early in the second half. When it looked like KUA would take the lead, key plays from Proctor's youngsters (two huge shots by Katelyn Barton '18 of Andover, and big shots down the stretch from Mikala Eacrett '19 of Londonderry) helped the Hornets hold onto a 39-35 win over the highly-favored number-one seed and advance to the championship.

On Super Sunday, the Hornets, joined by hundreds of members of the Proctor community, came out focused and relaxed. The girls quickly jumped out to a 12-2 lead, forcing LCA to call a

Forty Geothermal Wells Completed at Proctor

Construction continues on new Dining Commons

Construction on Proctor Academy's new 16,000 square foot Dining Commons continues as the winter weather recedes. The project is scheduled to be complete for the start of the 2016-2017 academic year.

As the external structure takes shape, crews are shifting their attention to installing underground utilities and completion of framing. Meanwhile, other crews are in the process of drilling the geothermal wells that will be used to heat and cool the new facility. Each of the 40 geothermal wells will circulate fluid between 300 and 500 feet below ground level as a way to capture a consistent 58-degree temperature well

below the earth's surface.

Geothermal heating and cooling technology has been successfully used in Peabody House, a dormitory housing two faculty families and 16 students, built in 2009, and will create considerable cost savings for Proctor in the future. Drilling for the geothermal wells should conclude relatively soon and is another exciting investment in the school's environmental mission statement.

Proctor appreciates the patience of the families and neighbors living nearby, as the drilling for these wells has been quite loud.
